Jettons-nous à l'eau ! In other words, let's jump in, get started! There are 3 parts to your summer homework: a reflection/essay (in English) over the exam itself, a diagnostic exam, and vocabulary to study.

THIS CODE EXPIRES JUNE 9.** If you don't join in time, e-mail me to get a new code. **Submit the Bienvenue à la Classe d'AP French assignment.**

Get the 2018 edition with the ORANGE 5 in the top right corner. It says it comes with an AUDIOCASSETTE but it is actually a CD and a digital download code.

D'abord...

First, go to the AP website for the French Language Exam and learn everything you can about the exam: format, scoring, length, date, etc. Then write a 150 word (minimum) reflection (in English). Include in your reflection 1) a summary of the format of the exam; 2) what section will be the easiest for you and why; 3) what section will be the most difficult for you and why; 4) brainstorm and research ideas and resources that you intend to use outside of class to help prepare you for the test. **Submit your reflection (as a file or a photo) on SeeSaw. This is worth 50 points.**

Ensuite...

As a resource for the year, we will be using 5 Steps to a 5, AP French Language book. You will take the diagnostic exam on pg. 11 in this book.

Before taking the diagnostic exam:

1. Remove the answer sheet on page 13 to write your multiple choice answers.
2. Take out several sheets of notebook paper to write your e-mail reply and argumentative essay. You will also want scrap paper for your speaking sections.
3. Make sure you have a way to keep time for your test. Do not go over the time limits listed for each part of the test.

During the exam:

1. Record your multiple choice answers on the answer document (pg. 13)
2. Write your e-mail reply (pg. 31) on notebook paper.
3. Write your argumentative essay (pg. 32) on notebook paper.
4. **Record your speaking sections on Flipgrid. Conversation (pg. 35)**

After the exam:

1. Grade your multiple choice answers using the key on pg. 37. READ the explanations for each correct answer. Write the total number of questions you got right at the top of your answer document and circle it. **Post a picture of your answer document on SeeSaw.**
2. Read the sample open response answers on pg. 46-50. Look at the rubrics on google classroom <https://drive.google.com/file/d/lkbrQLBIA5J9HP2MVfbnOPb-mKaRxFnxj/view?usp=sharing> . Score yourself based on the criteria in the scoring guides. **Upload pictures of your e-mail reply and argumentative essay on SeeSaw.**
3. **Fill in the ORQ Reflection document on SeeSaw.**

This is worth 200 points.
